

Alliance Grant Priority

Promote the adoption of established IPM practices that reduce the use of pesticides of human health or environmental concern through the guidance of a collaborative team of knowledgeable participants known as an Alliance

The focus is outreach, research may be a minor component

Funding = \$400,000 total

(grants may range from \$50,000 to \$400,000)



2017-2018 Focus for Alliance projects:

Agricultural Pesticide Use Near Schools

In 2017 the Department of Pecticide Regulation's (DPR) Pest Management Alliance Grant Program will fund projects that focus on adoption of integrated pest management (IPM) practices in agricultural settings near schools.

Critical grant program dates

- 11 concepts were received February 5, 2016
- Applicants invited to submit proposals February 26, 2016
- 7 proposals were received April 1, 2016
- Grants to be awarded, June 30, 2016
- Project start date, September 1, 2016

Continued adoption of ASD through educational
workshops, demonstrations, and outreach materials

for all California growers

PI: Stefanie Bourcier Organization: Farm Fuel, Inc. Amount Requested: \$243,396

The purpose of this project will be to continue work in the education and demonstration of the utility of ASD as a soil treatment strategy for California growers regardless of crop type, and expand that work beyond berry growers.

Demonstrating and teaching the effectiveness of bee pollinator-compatible IPM programs in ornamental horticulture

PI: Christine Casey Organization: UC, Davis Amount Requested: \$396,632

Project will select from established IPM methods

to develop bee pollinator-compatible IPM programs for demonstration sites. Programs will be tested over two years and compared with similar sites managed via traditional IPM methods to evaluate their effectiveness at conserving pollinators in a variety of ornamental crop and urban garden settings.

Reducing the Insecticide Runoff by Implementing Lower Risk Urban IPM Strategies

PI: Dong Hwan Choe Organization: UC, Riverside Amount Requested: \$187,703

In close collaboration with ongoing urban IPM outreach projects and statewide water quality monitoring programs, project will actively promote and implement urban IPM strategies via state-wide educational events and other educational tools, and focus on training industry participants to adopt these IPM practices.

The overall goal of this project is to quantify the degree to which progress along the IPM continuum, as measured by use of bioIPM practices reduces high-risk pesticide applications. Project will also create a grower-friendly model that captures the endomic consequences of slippage down, or progress along the IPM continuum.
